TOPIC: LYME IN IRELAND: DIAGNOSTIC CHALLENGES, TREATMENT CHALLENGES, AND NEUROPSYCHIATRIC COMPLICATIONS



DR. JOHN (JACK) LAMBERT is Consultant in Infectious diseases in Dublin at the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital and Professor at UCD School of Medicine. Dr. Lambert has a 25 years experience in Infectious Diseases covering HIV, Hepatitis C, and other disease areas. He has trained in the USA, UK, and worked for 6 years in Baltimore at the Johns Hopkins Institutes and the University of Maryland Institute of Human Virology, where he developed his skills in vaccinology, HIV, and Lyme and Co Infections. He has consultant specialty certifications in adult and pediatric infectious diseases, general medicine and pediatrics, and in sexual health (genitourinary medicine). He currently leads the National Isolation Unit of Ireland, managing all emerging infections, including Ireland's Ebola effort. He currently is the only Infectious Diseases physician managing Lyme and Co-Infections and has developed a private practice seeing such patients.

TOPIC: TICKS AND TAILS DOWN WICKLOW WAY: A CASE STUDY

The presentation will outline the prevalence of Deer Ticks & Lyme disease in Ireland and its growing importance to mental health. Psychiatric presentations are considered with a case example. Difficulties and pitfalls in recognition, screening and investigation will be considered.

- Recognising signs of early and late infection in mental health care

DR JUSTIN BROPHY is currently Consultant Psychiatrist in General Adult Psychiatry at HSE Wicklow Mental Health Services, and is also the Clinical Advisor to Ireland's 'National Office of Suicide Prevention'. He is a Fellow of The Royal College of Psychiatrists, a Senior Lecturer in Psychiatry at the Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland and a Director of 'Jigsaw', a national youth mental health service charity. Dr Brophy is a former ECD and CD of HSE Dublin South East / Wicklow Mental Health Services. He was the Foundation President of the College of Psychiatrists of Ireland.
